V18 records the response of the people to Nehemiah's call.

The people worked 'with all their heart' (4:6) despite opposition, threats, mockery and ridicule. The temptation to give up (4:10) and pursue a quiet life must have been very real for the people of God then, as it is for us now.

 How can we resist that temptation to give up when we feel discouraged and defeated?

Rubble in our work (4:10) can take many forms: procrastination, discouragements, fear, unbelief, boredom or just plain dislike for a job.
