Read 2 Kings 6:8-23

- 1. This account from the life of the prophet Elisha represents a great crisis. How can we learn from Elisha's response to the crisis to inform how we respond to the crises we face in our own life/nation at this time?

- 8. Discuss the relevance of the city of Dothan as the place not only where Elisha was found but also where Joseph was lowered into the pit and began his many years of suffering (Genesis 37:17). Reflect on how Joseph understood what happened to him? How might that encourage you to have faith in God's purposes?
- 9. If prayer is the means of access to our all sufficient Saviour, how can we use the times to deepen our prayer life with God? (Read Paul's encouragement from Phil 4:6-7 and his own context).
- 10. As we commune with God in prayer, we gain wisdom to know how to deal with trials when they come to us so that we can respond with peace not a sense of panic. How was this a reality for Elisha?
